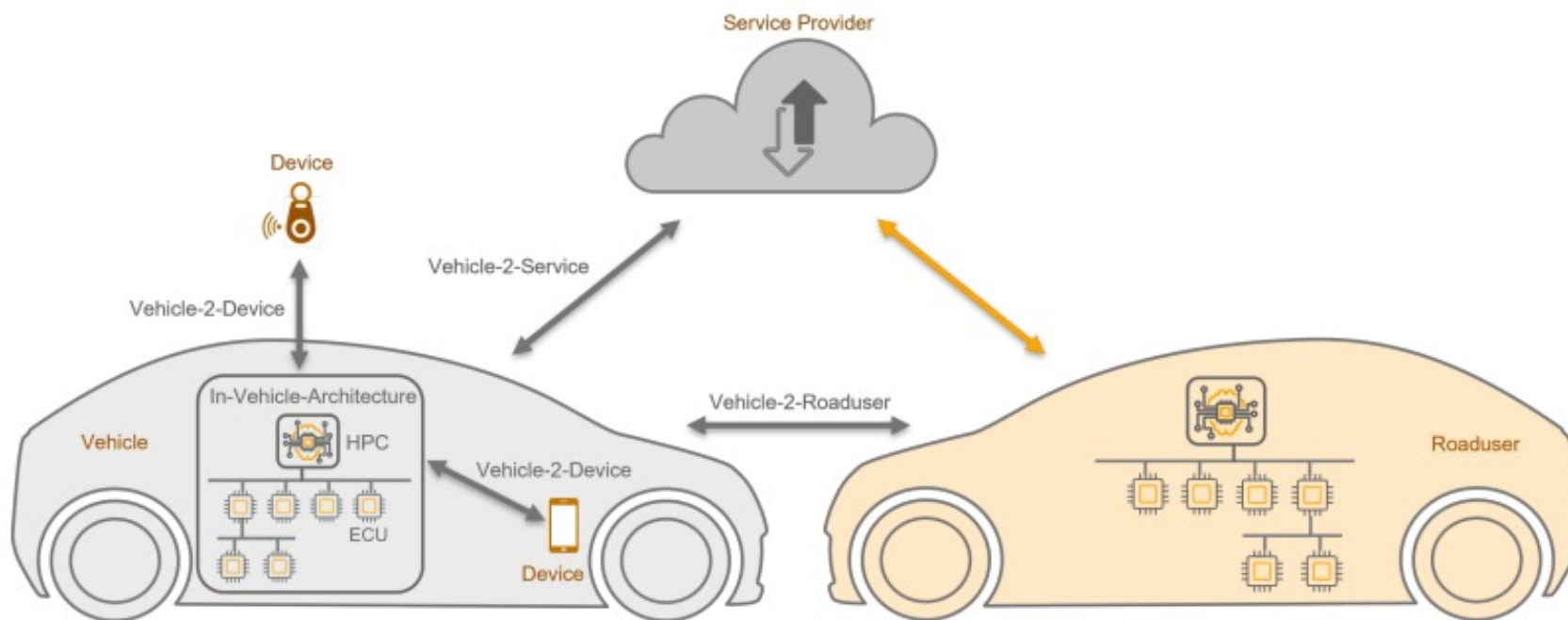

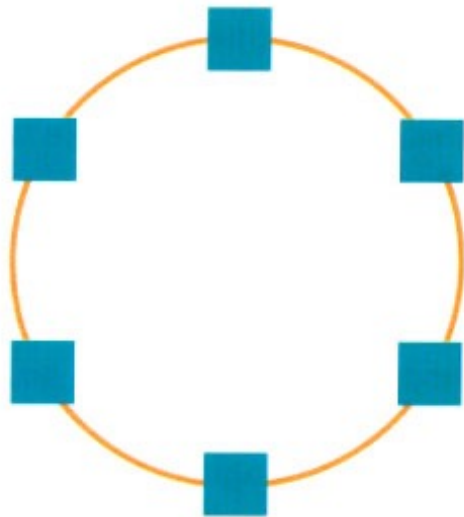
System Model Entities & Core Model



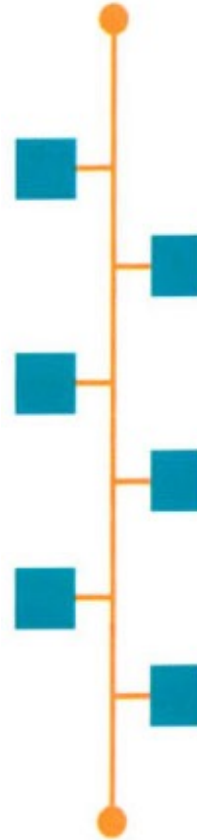
- Definition of wiring and signalling standards for local area networks (LAN)
- Developed in the beginning of the 1970s by Xerox and from 1980 continued by DEC, Intel and Xerox (DIX group)
- Implementation of an access method called Carrier Sense Multiple Access/Collision Detection (CSMA/CD), an enhancement of the Aloha concept, which was previously developed at the University of Hawaii
- Thus, Ethernet is a product name by Xerox, DEC and Intel, in which the product itself had not been compatible to the IEEE specification 802.3 for years.

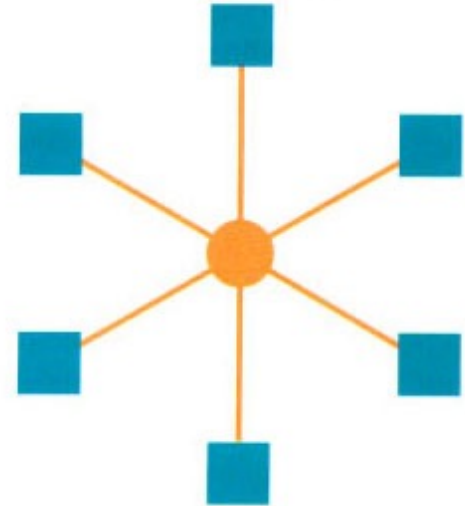
Ring Topology



Bus Topology

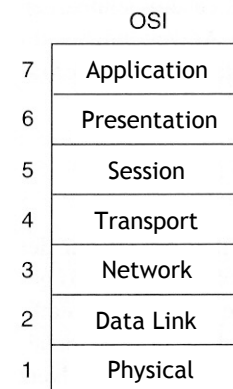


Star Topology

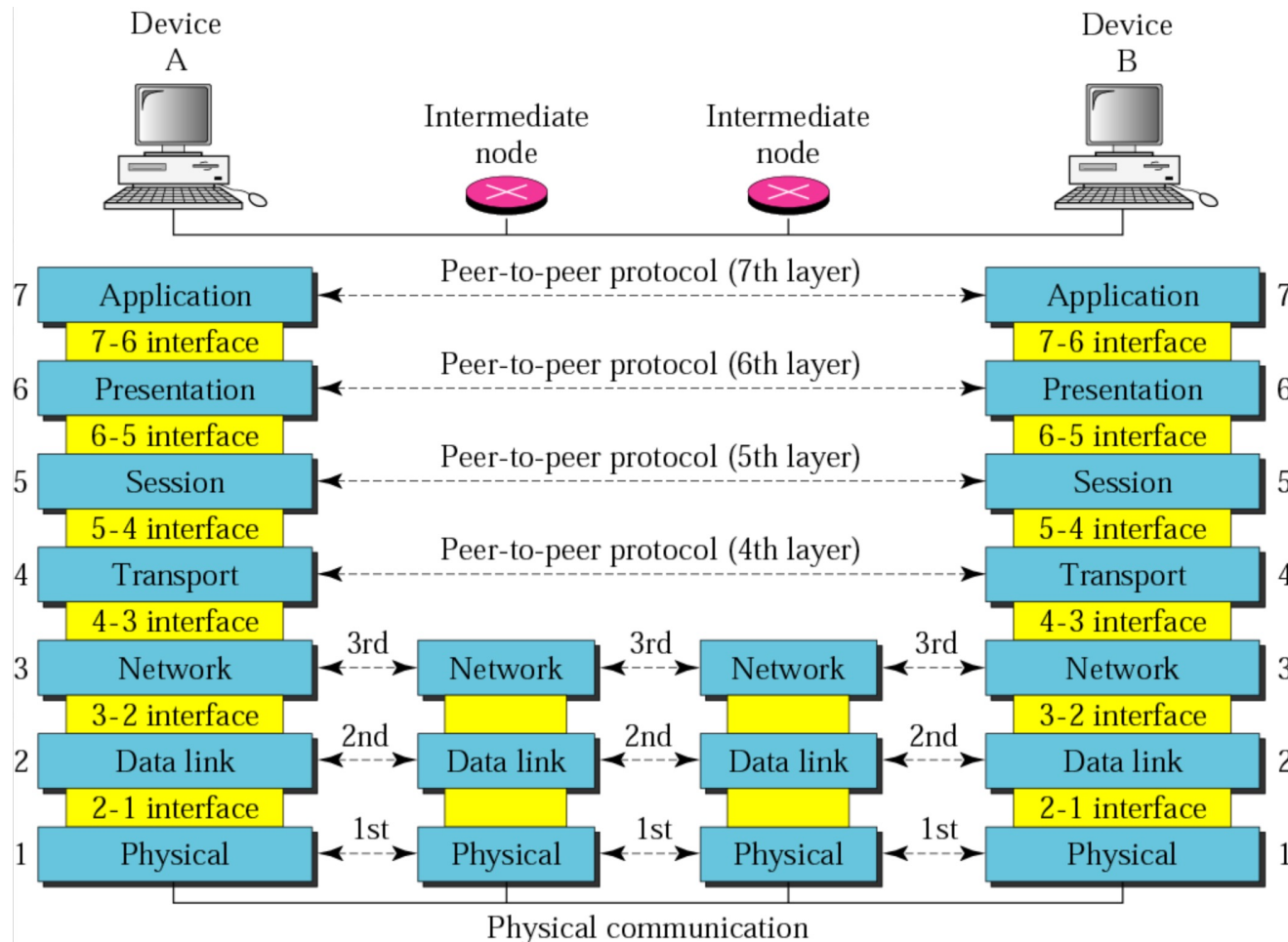

- The OSI reference model consists of **seven** layers:
 - **Layers 1-4** are **transport-oriented** layers as they focus on the transportation of bits.
 - **Layers 5-7** are **application-oriented** layers as they support the use of data transport applications.
 - The following basic ideas have lead to the 7 layers:
 - Whenever a new **level of abstraction** is necessary, a new layer has to be introduced
 - Each layer should deal with one well-defined task or function.



OSI Reference Model



Layer 1: Physical Layer

- The **physical layer** is the lowermost layer of the OSI model. It defines **mechanical, electrical and time-related** specifications for interfaces to the network. It deals with the **transmission of bits** over a communication channel.
- Typical transmission-related questions are:
 - How to represent bits?
 - Definition and assignment of connectors and pins.
 - How to achieve full-duplex transmission (both directions simultaneously)?
 - Connection set-up and termination
 - Which are the available transmission media?

Layer 7: Application Layer Definition

- All layers below the application layer serve the purpose of ensuring reliable transport of data, but they do not perform any specific tasks for the user.
- The application layer contains a multitude of protocols which are often needed by users in order for applications to work.
 - DNS
 - E-Mail
 - FTP
 - HTTP
 - Skype
 - ...

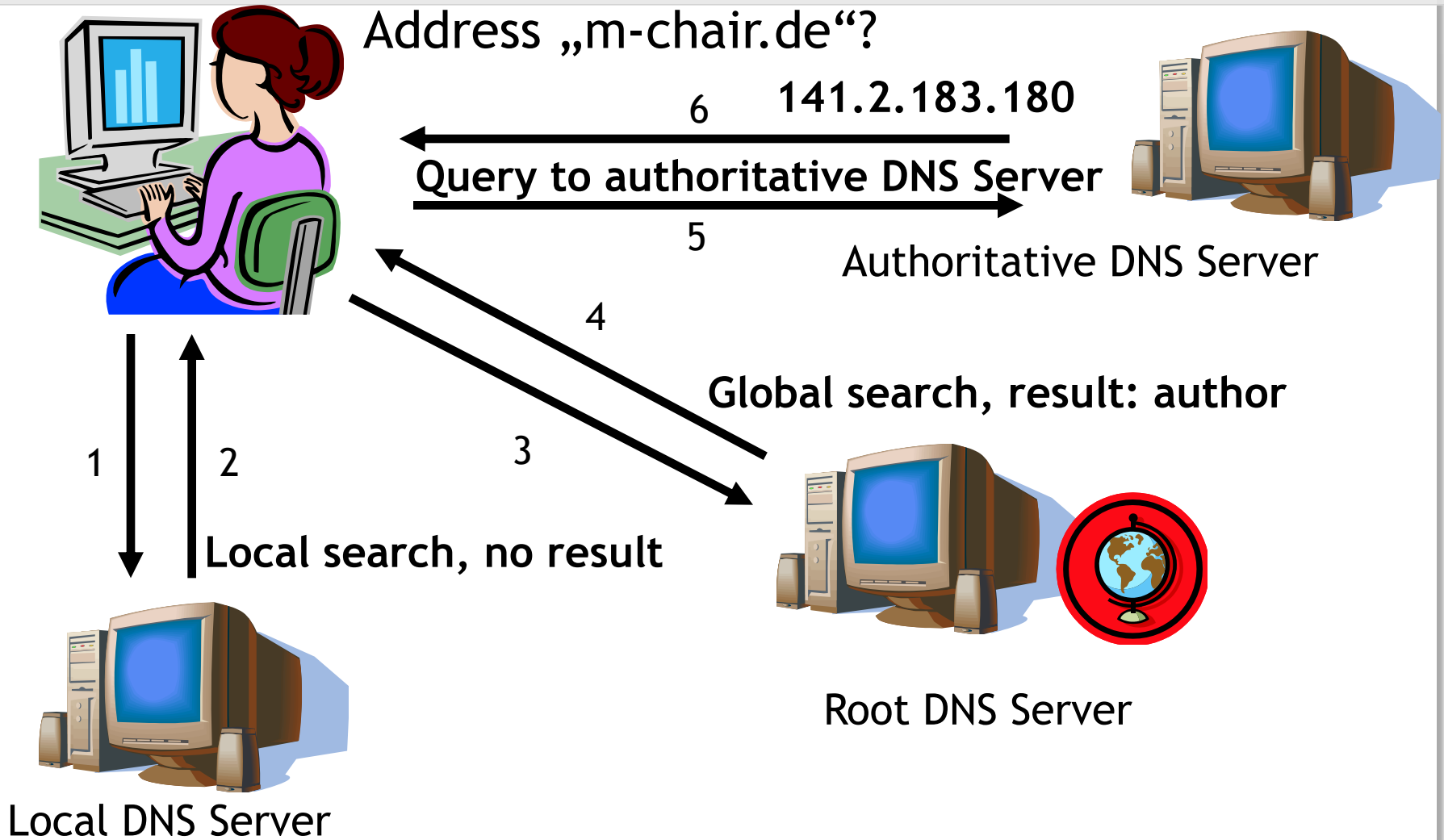
Layer 7: Application Layer

Example: Domain Name System

- Introduction of a distributed database, the „Domain Name System“ (DNS).
- The DNS is located on the application layer.
- The DNS translates names into addresses, addresses into names or provides e.g. information about the IP address of a mail server for a domain (mail exchange or MX record).
- There are three types of DNS Servers:
 - Local: DNS server inside the organisation (of your own)
 - Root: Root DNS of a domain
 - Authoritative: Authoritative name servers are assigned to be responsible for particular domain names.

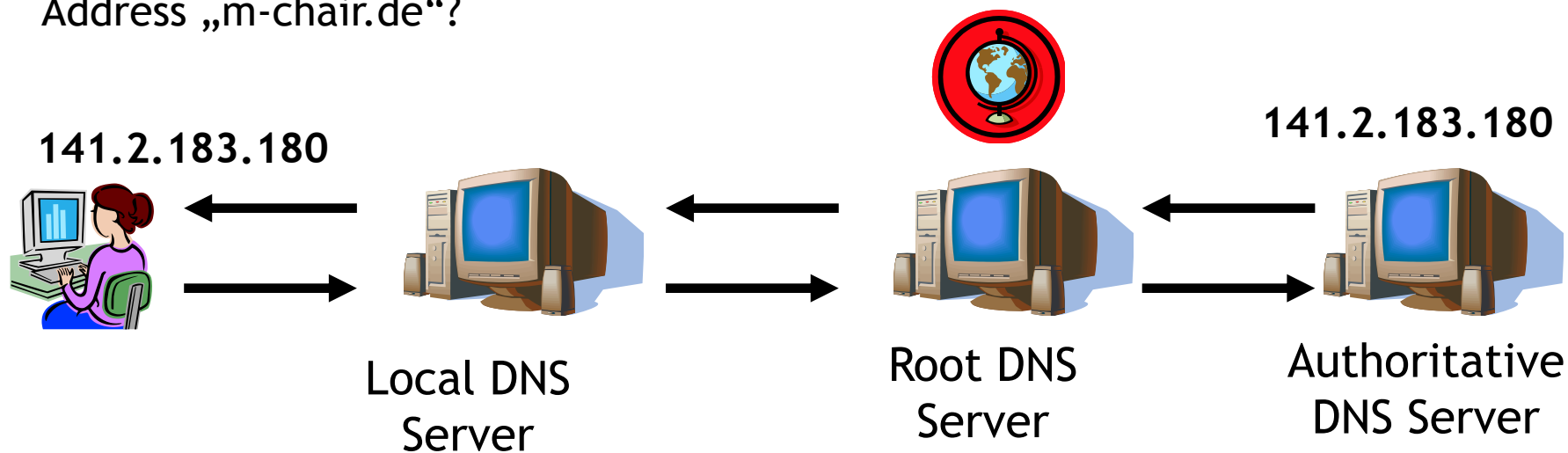

Cell-Based Communication (CBC)

What is a Cellular Network?

- Cellular networks are radio networks consisting of several transmitters.
- Each transmitter or base station, covers a certain area ➔ *a cell*.
- Cell radii can vary from tens of meters to several kilometres.
- The shape of a cell is influenced by the environment (buildings, etc.) and usually neither hexagonal nor a perfect circle, even though this is the usual way of drawing them.

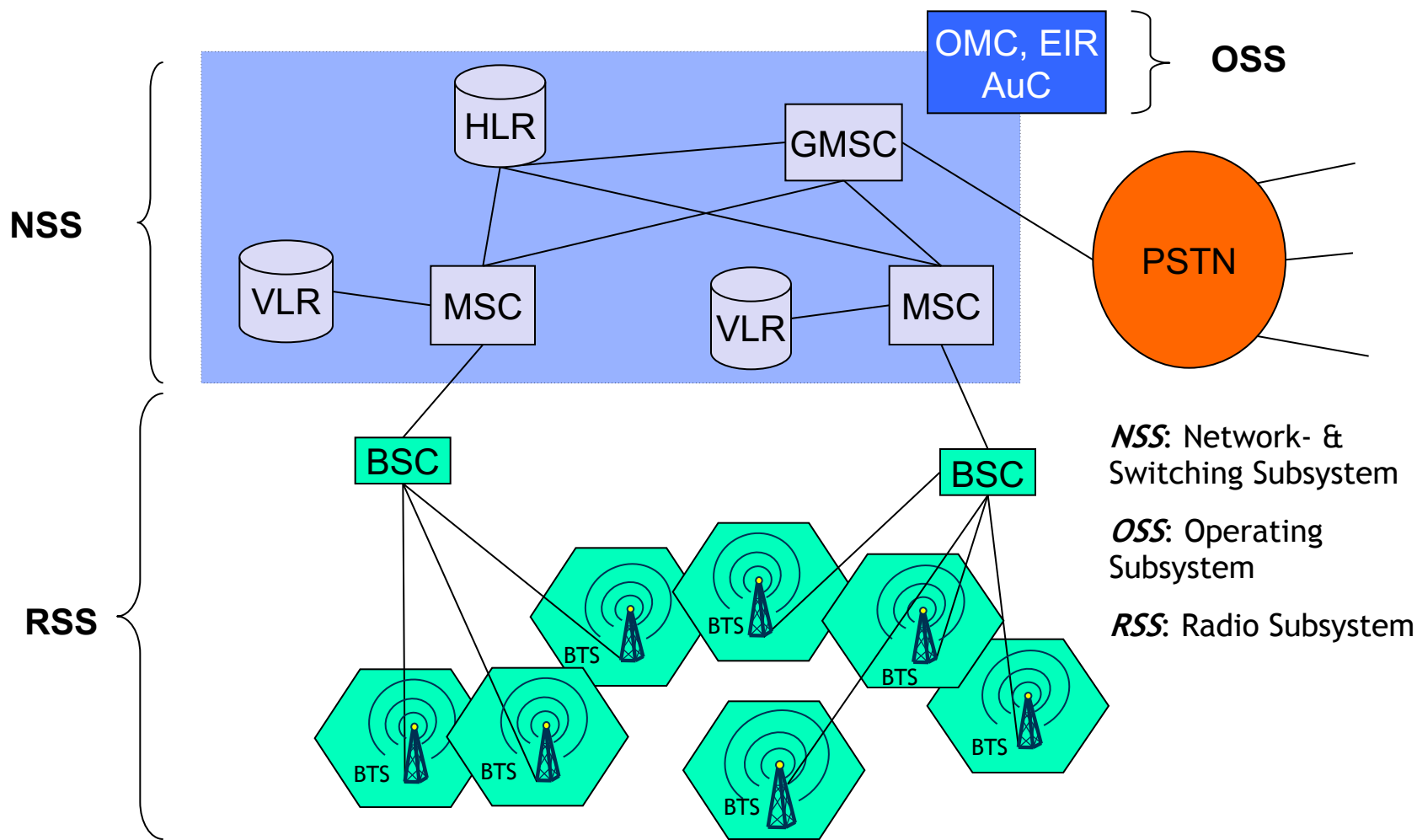

- Cellular networks offer a number of advantages compared to centralised radio systems:
 - ***Higher capacity:*** Cells offer the possibility to “reuse” the transmission frequencies assigned to mobile devices (e.g. by multiplexing). In order to do so, the networks need a thorough planning of the position of base stations and their frequencies.
 - ➔ More users can use the infrastructure
 - ***Reduced transmission power:*** Reduced power usage for the mobile device, due to the fact that only a limited amount of transmission power is needed in a small cell, compared to a far away base station.
 - ➔ Reduced power consumption for mobile devices

- Cellular networks offer a number of advantages compared to centralised radio systems:
 - **Robustness:** Cellular systems are decentralised with regard to their base stations. In the case that one antenna fails, only a small area gets affected.
 - ➔ Failure of one base station does not affect the complete infrastructure
 - **Better coverage:** Cells can be adapted to geographic conditions (mountains, buildings, etc.).
 - ➔ Better availability of the infrastructure

But: A complex and costly infrastructure is required, in order to link all base stations. This includes switches, antennas, location registers, etc.

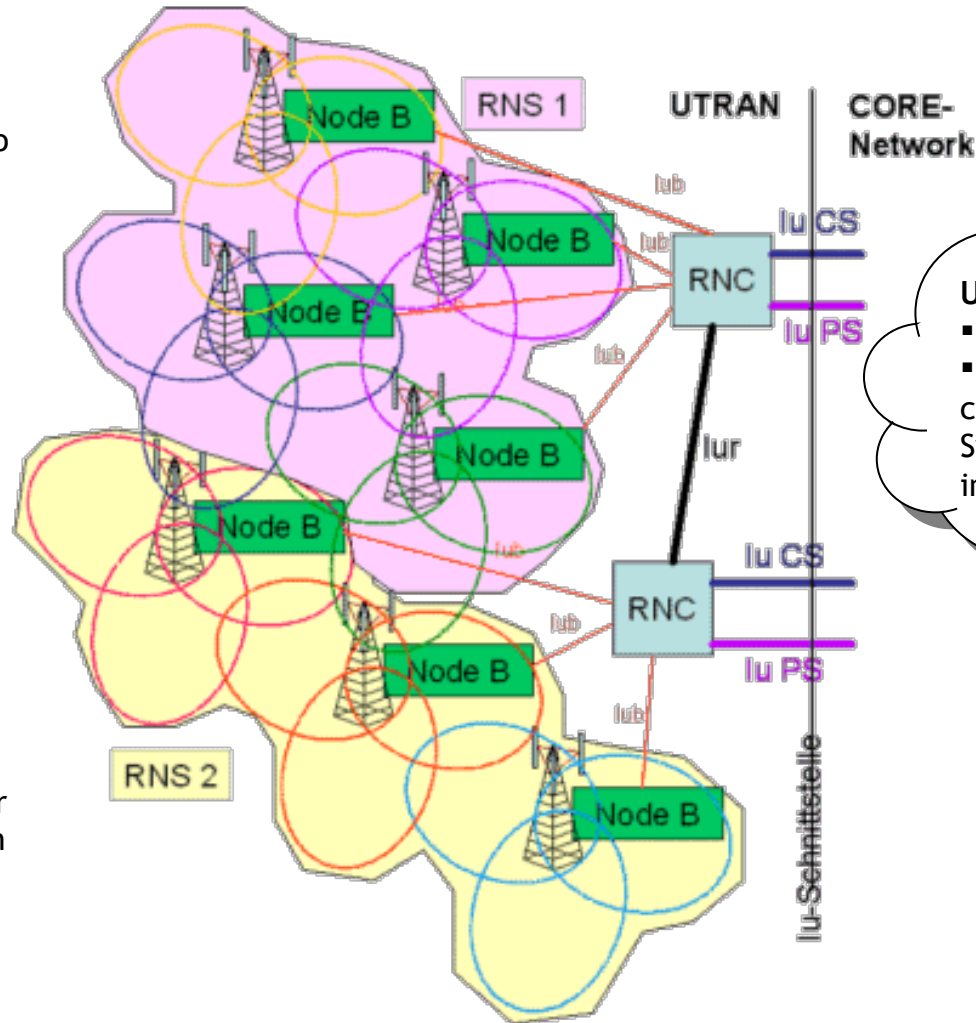
OSS: Operating Subsystem

UMTS Core network

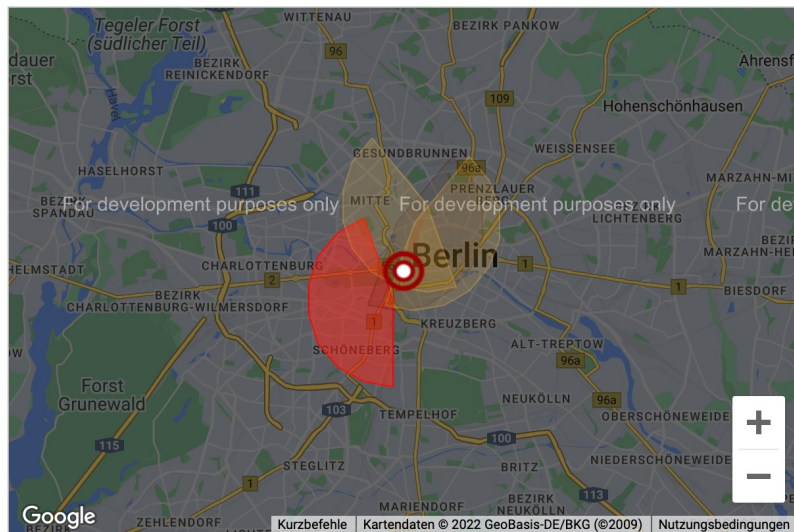

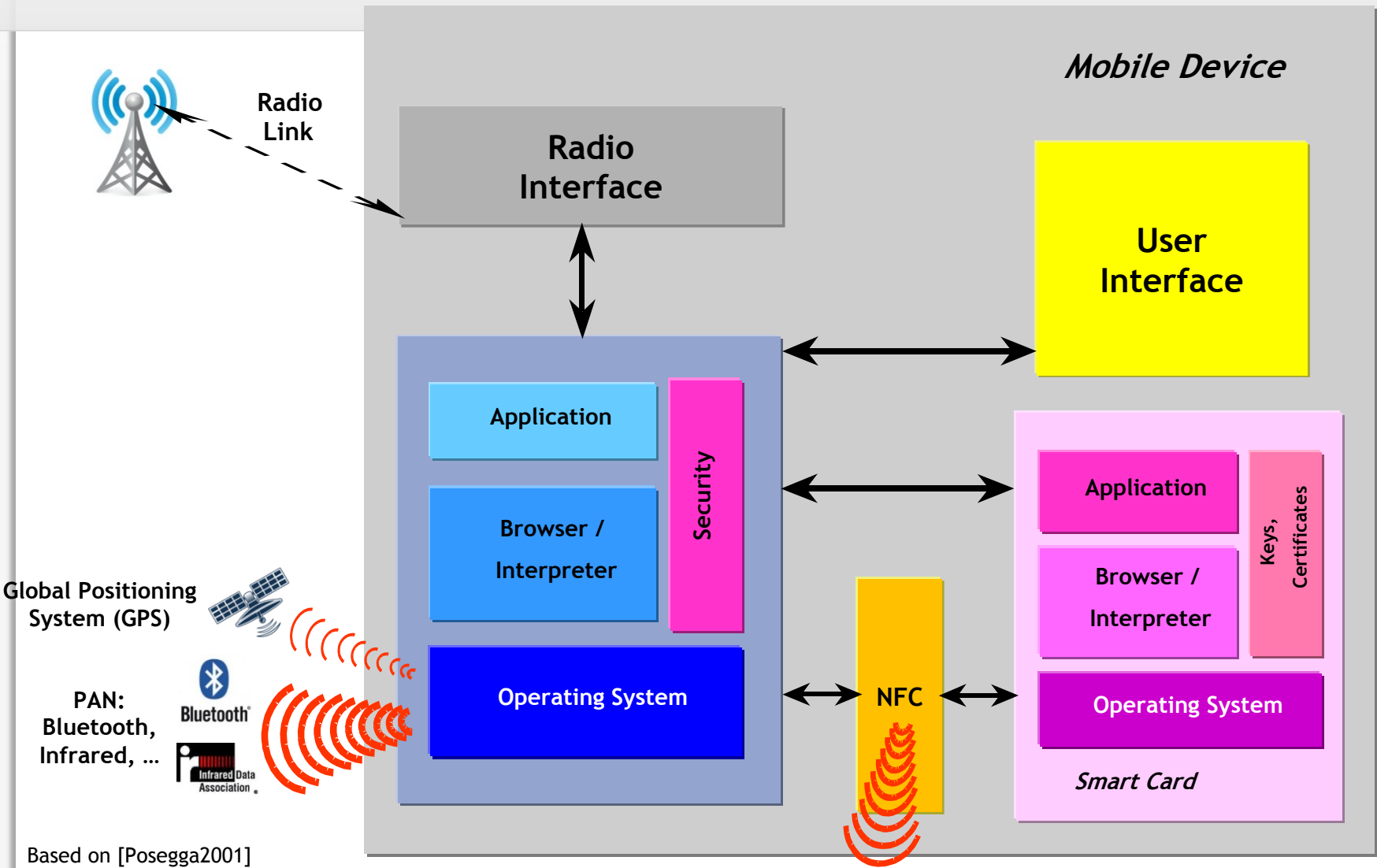

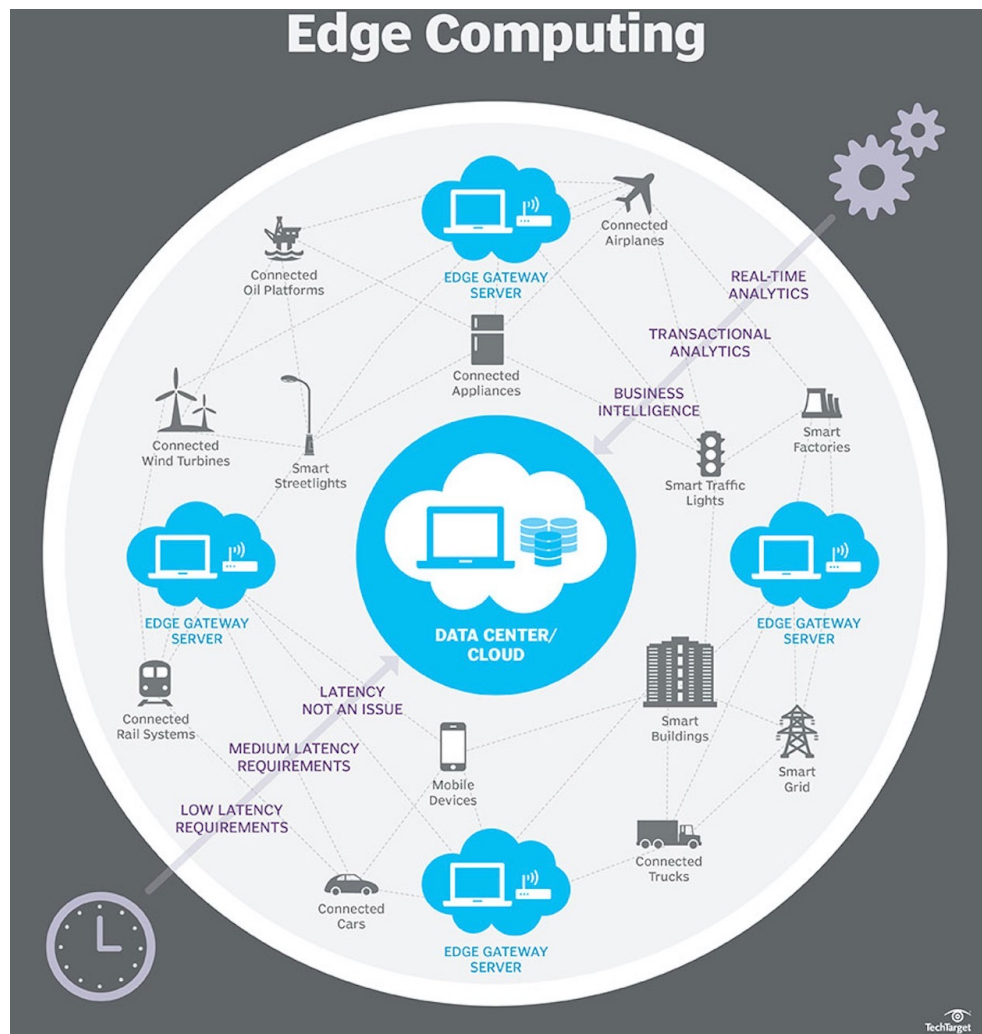
Pushing "intelligence" to the edge of the network

- Why edge computing?
 - Proliferation of IoT devices producing data to be processed
 - Limitations due to centralized nature of cloud architectures
 - Clouds' quality of service impacted by distance to data center
 - Steady decline in the cost of processing power & appearance of intelligent endpoint devices that sense and can make inferences

- What is edge computing?
 - Distributed approach to computing at/near network-endpoints
 - Heterogeneous nomenclature [edge (2004-), fog (2012-) and mist (2015-) computing] due to multiple interests and approaches
 - None of them synonymous with cloud computing

Edge Computing Architecture: Advantages and Applications

- Lower core network load and transmission costs since less / pre-processed data is transmitted
- Reduced load on cloud server / data centre and more efficient resource use possible
- Reduced latency key enabler of use-cases like autonomous driving
- New functionalities provided by intelligent endpoint devices



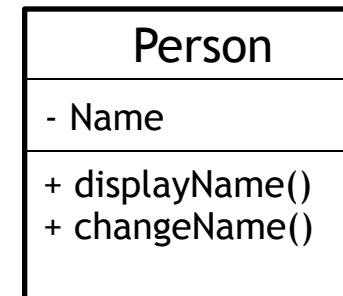
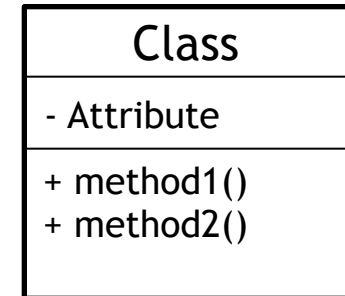
Edge Computing Architecture: Disadvantages

- Security challenges
 - Distributed architecture increases number of attack vectors.
 - The more "intelligent" the device, the more vulnerable to infections and exploits (e.g. integrated webserver)
 - IP address spoofing, man-in-the-middle attacks
- Trust and authentication concerns
- Risk of a configuration drift when inferior device management solutions are implemented
- Fixed physical location and cost of hardware
- "Hidden" licensing costs of endpoint devices (base version vs. additional functionalities)
- Sometimes adding unnecessary overhead and complexity to the system, as not always needed for IoT applications

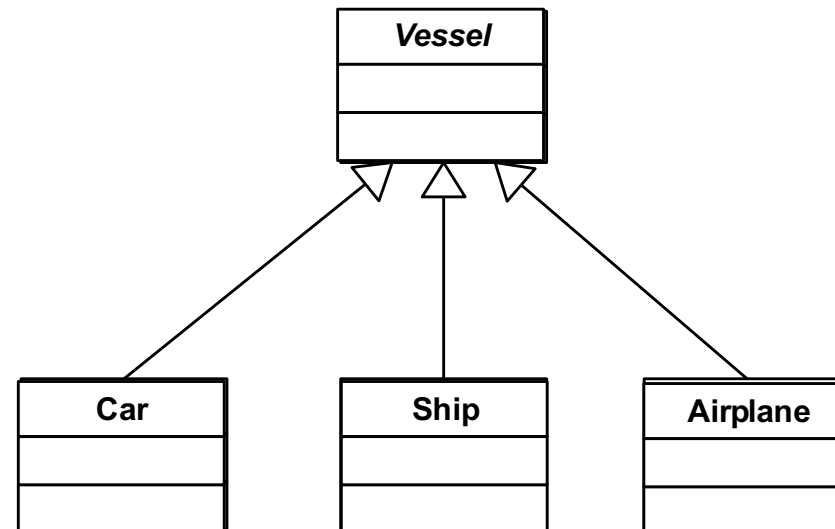
- Class diagrams
 - Representation of the static structure of a software system
 - Description of logical relations between structural elements
 - No activity or control logic
- Object diagrams
 - Instances of a class diagram
 - „Snapshot“ of a system during runtime

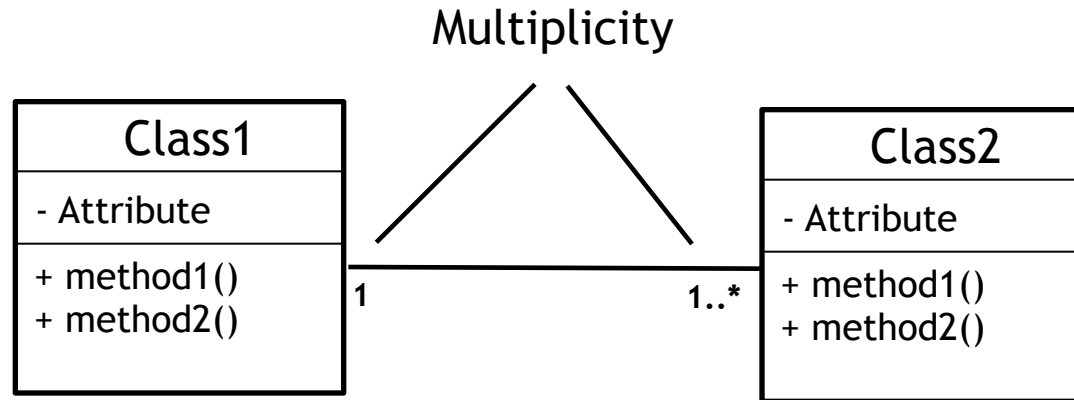
- Classes are represented by rectangles, which include the name of the class, its attributes and methods.
- The class name is in singular and starts with an upper case letter.
- Attributes and methods are separated by horizontal lines.
- „+/-“: Attribute/Method is public/private



- **Class attributes**
 - Class attributes belong to the class, not to the object.
 - Class attributes have the same value for all instances (objects). For instance, attribute „Number“ to count the number of created objects for a class.
 - Class attributes are underlined in the class diagram.
- **Class methods**
 - Class methods are executed within the class not on the object.
 - E.g. „count number of created objects of the class“
 - The class method is underlined in the class diagram.

- Definition / aggregation of common properties
- An abstract class does not allow objects to be instantiated.
- Template to create subclasses
- Abstract methods get “overwritten” by default
- The name of abstract classes is written in italic.



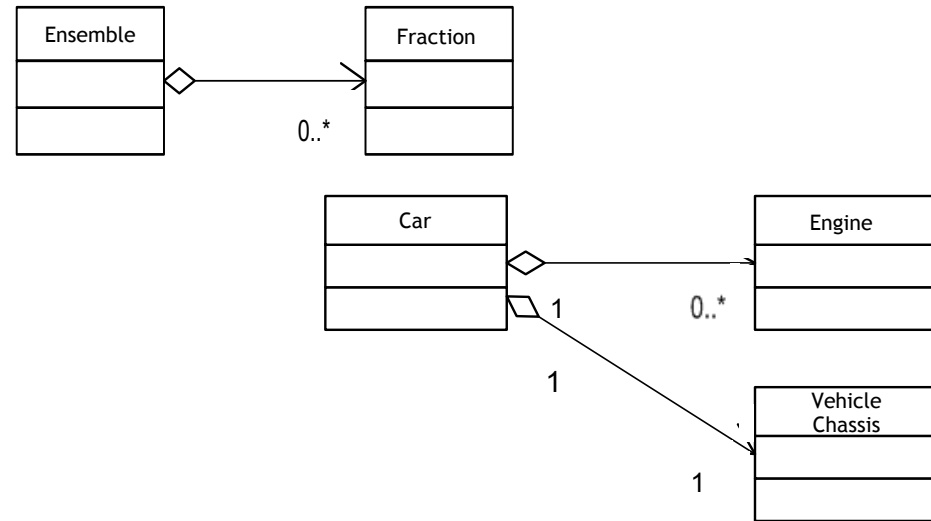


- Describes the relationship between two classes
- It is represented by a line connecting the two classes.
- The multiplicity min..max attached to the association defines the minimal or maximal number of associations between the objects of the two classes.

(*) denotes any number of objects.

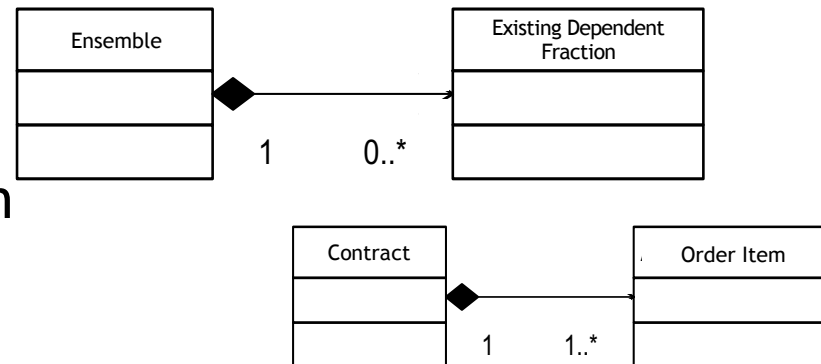

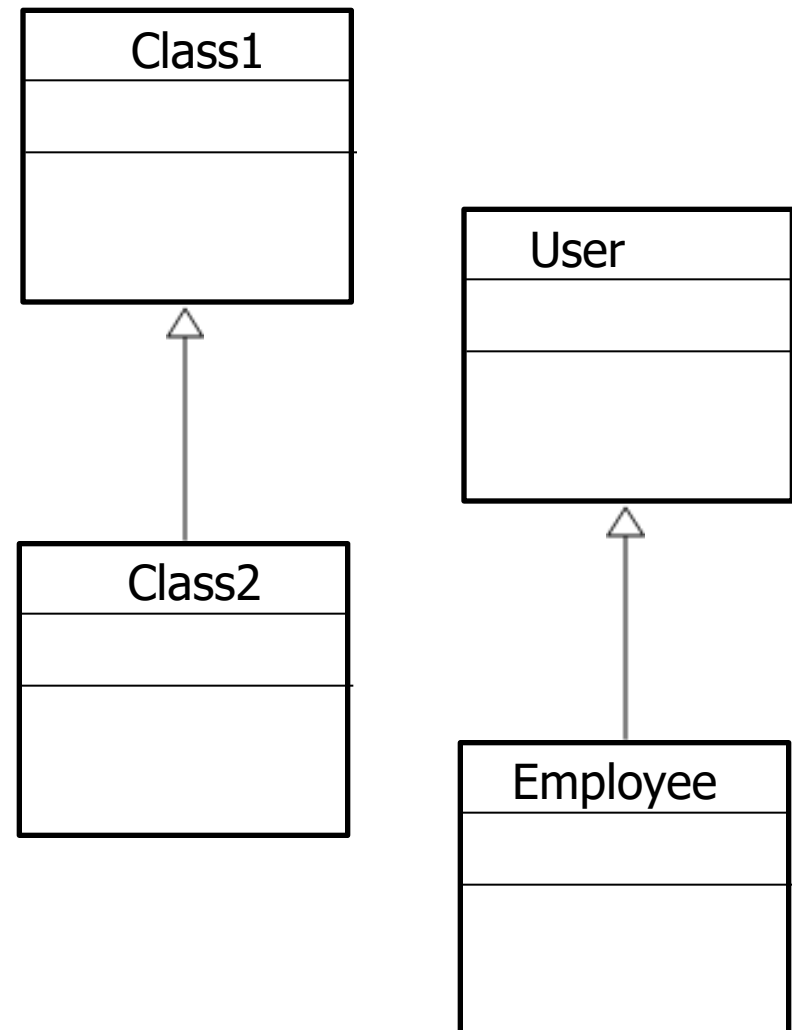


- Composition

- Composition is a stronger variant of the aggregation
- Denotes an “owns a” relationship



- Denotes an relation between parent class and subclass
- Is represented by a line with an empty arrow at the end, pointing towards the parent class
- Class2 inherits from Class1.
- Purpose:
 - Reuse code, by objects which can be based on previously created objects



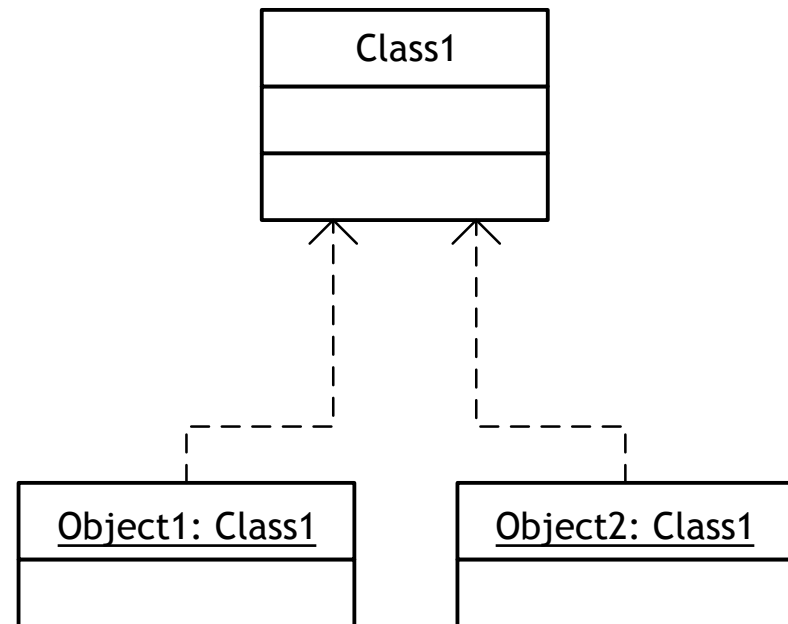

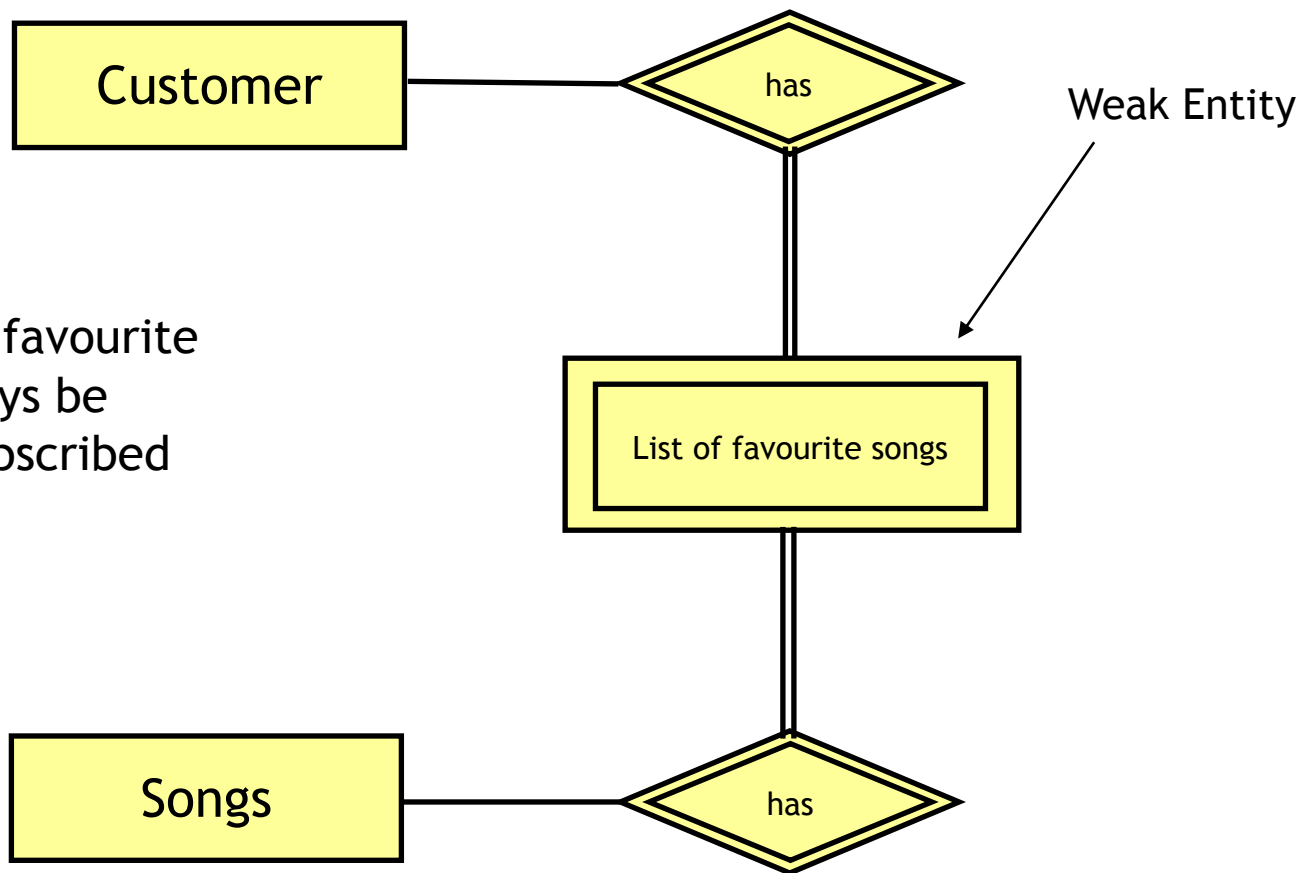
Activity Diagram (Example)

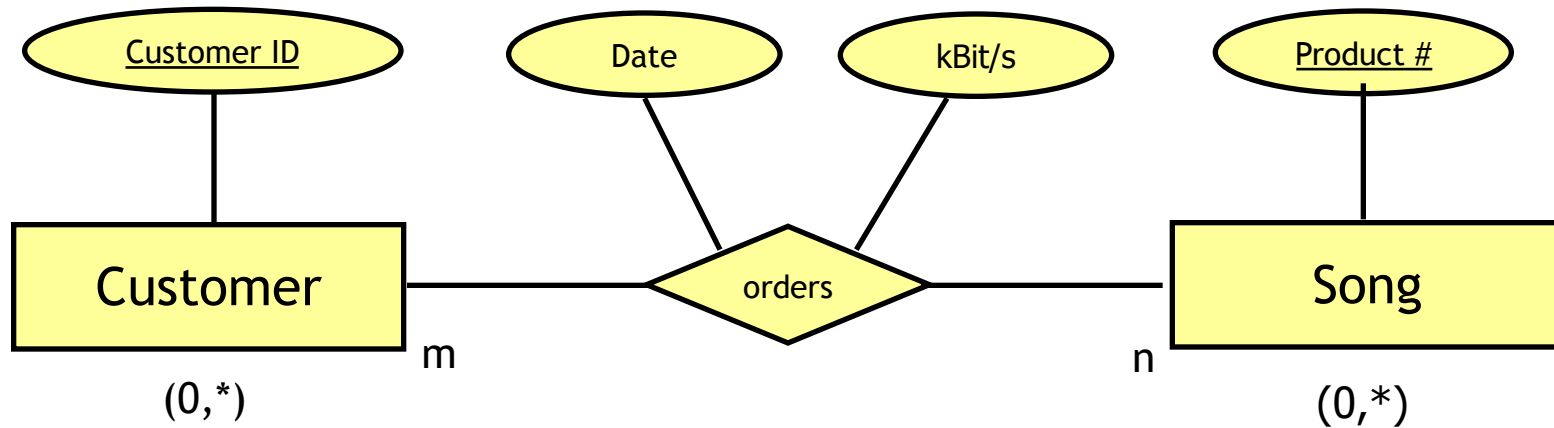
An active list of favourite songs must always be assigned to a subscribed customer.

Example Relationship with Attributes

- Many **Customers** can order many **songs**. **Customers are** uniquely identified by the attribute Customer ID. Each **song** has a unique identifier called **Product #**. The orders relationship has the attributes **date**, recording when the order was placed, and **kBit/s**, indicating the quality or speed of the song's digital file.

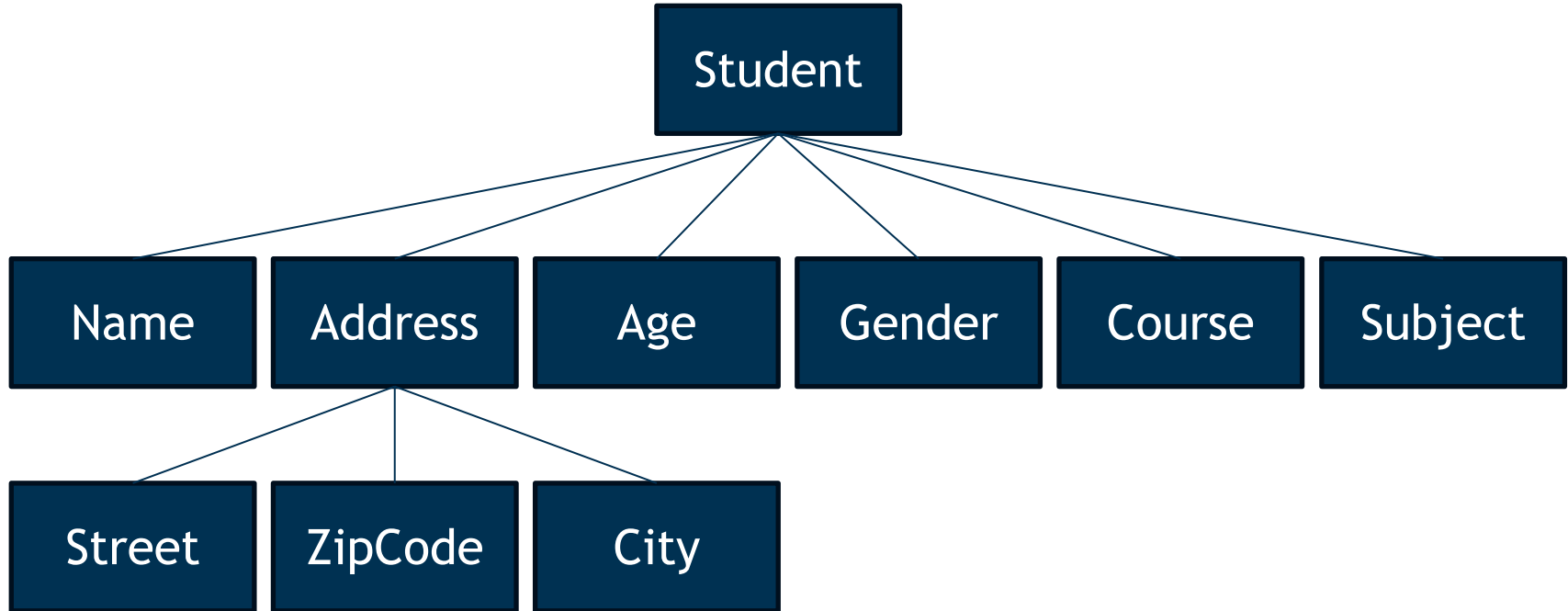

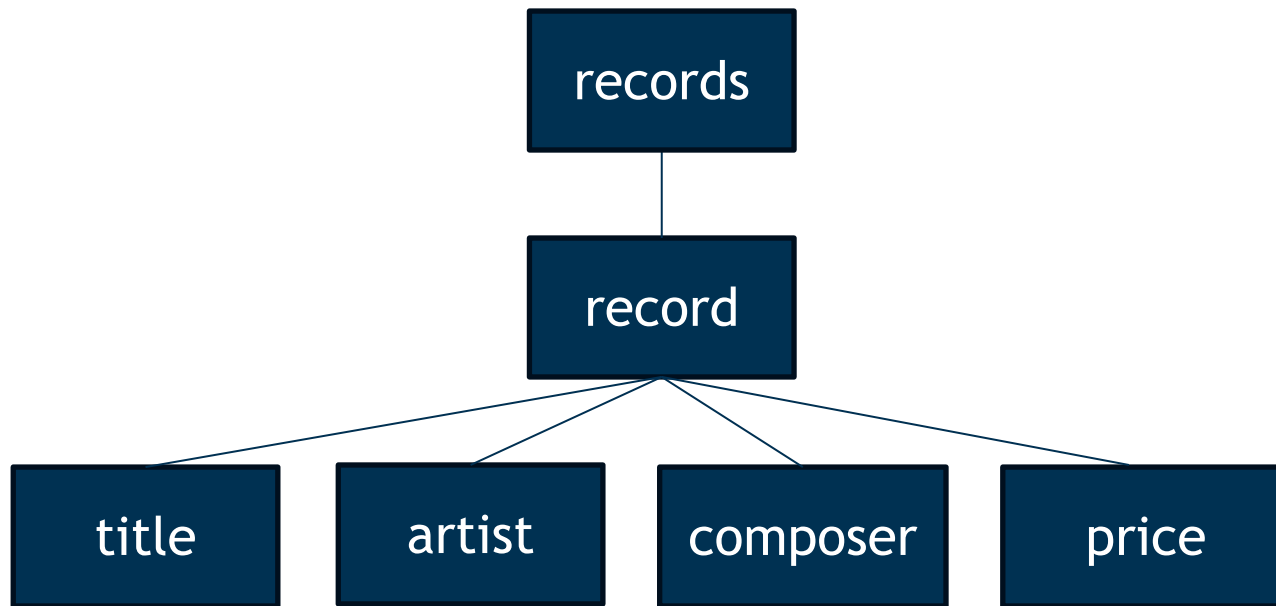

Exkurs Determinismus Regel:

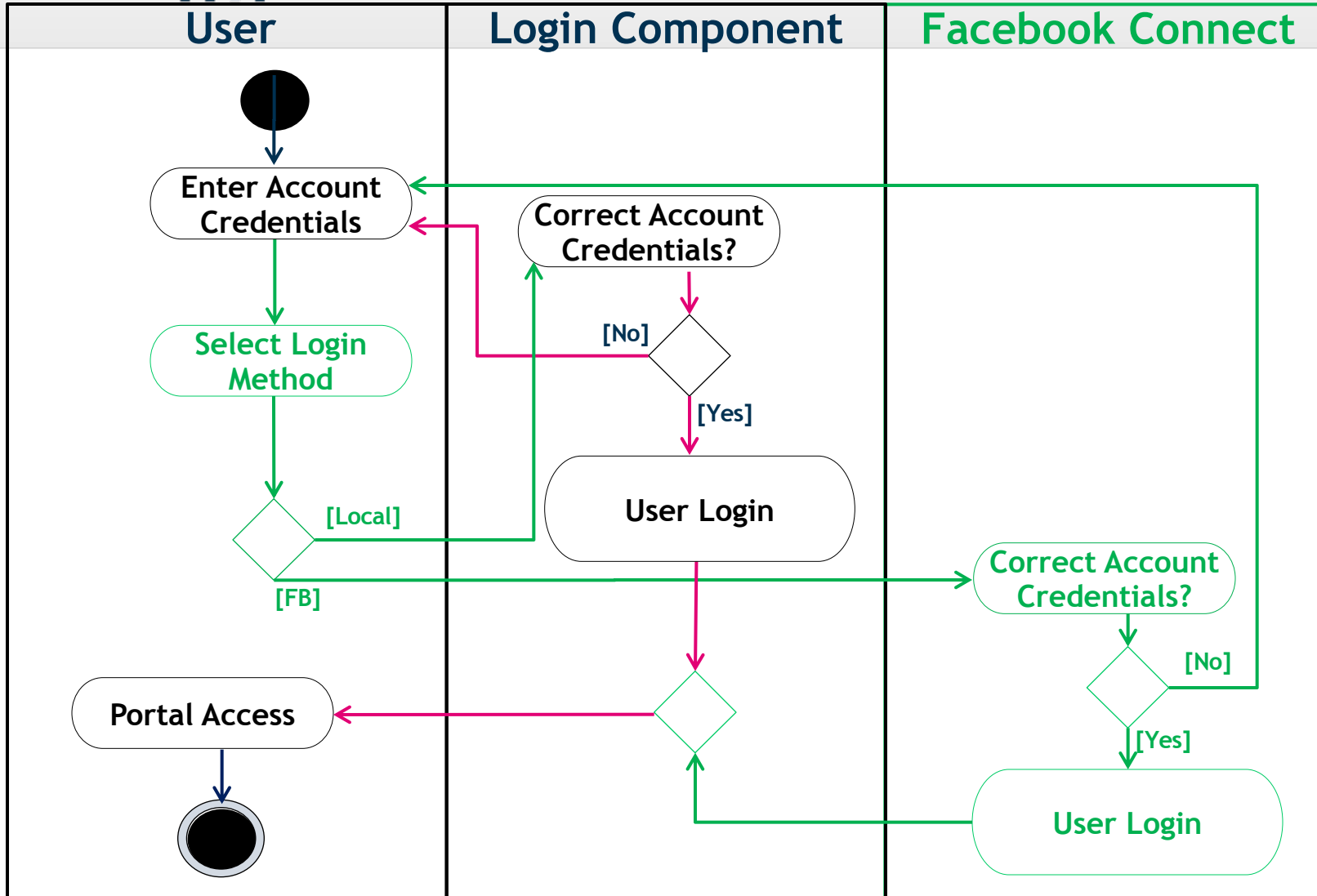
- „It is required that content models in element type declarations be deterministic“

- When an XML parser reads b, it cannot determine whether this is the end of a* or the beginning of a new b element without waiting for further information. This violates the rule of the deterministic content model.
